



HALLOWEEN WREATH

SUPPLIES & TOOLS

- 18 in. Box Wreath Frame #77479584
- Black Sugar 'n Cream Yarn #77641522
- 3 or more 10 yd. rolls of 2-1/2 in. Wired Ribbon - Halloween Prints/Colors - assorted
- Scissors
- Ruler or yardstick for measuring
- Embellishments - Spiders, floral, etc.



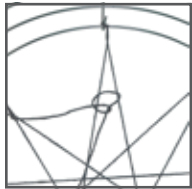
NOTE: For the Countdown to Halloween wreath - Tagged Treats bags are plastic goodie bags in orange #30220008 tied with Apple Green 3/8-in. sheer ribbon #30116728. The numbered tags are printed from the computer onto white cardstock. The tags are cut out and a hole is punched at the top then tied to ribbons around the goodie bag. The goodie bags were trimmed to a shorter height. The goodie bags were attached to the wreath with paperclips but you can use mini clothespins or binder clips, etc.

INSTRUCTIONS

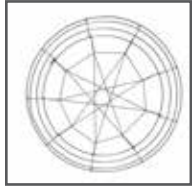


1. Making the Spider Web - The frame has 9 outer sections, use this as a guide.

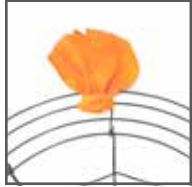
Measure out 5 yards of yarn. To start, tie the end of the yarn to one of the sections' wire dividers. Go across the center of the wreath and tie to a divider on the opposite side.



3. Tie yarn to one of the strand "spokes", about 2 inches down from the frame. Move to the right and wrap the yarn around the two strands that form a skinny triangle, bringing the strands together as one.



5. Continue until you are back to the first strand. Tie off the yarn and cut.



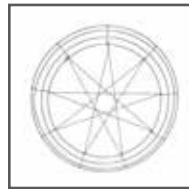
7. Cut your ribbon into pieces about 10 in. to 12 in. lengths. The number of ribbons needed depends on how full your ribbons flare out and how full you want the wreath. You can cut the ends at an angle or fishtail or leave it to unravel a little for a "spookier" look. Tie a ribbon onto the second outermost ring of the wreath.



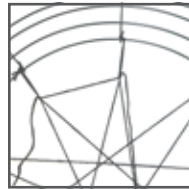
9. Repeat steps 7 and 8 with the innermost ring of the wreath. Tie the ribbon on and fluff out to make the wreath full.



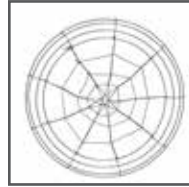
11. Use as a Countdown to Halloween Display - Make 13 small treat holders and number them 1 - 13. Here, we tied tags to the ribbon of the treat bags. Add a paperclip to the back to attach to the wreath, or use mini wooden clothespin, etc.



2. Continue criss-crossing until you have yarn tied to each hook. The yarn looks similar to "spokes" on a wheel. Securely knot the end of the yarn and cut off excess.



4. Knot securely. Move on to the next set of yarn "spokes".



6. Starting about 2 inches down, repeat steps 3 - 5, tying yarn to spokes.

Continue this process to make more rings on the yarn until you have a complete spider web look.



8. Tie 3 ribbons or more in each section of the second outermost ring. Spread out the ribbon tails.



10. Add embellishments - Here are some ideas:

- Add a spider to the web
- Add firefly lights or use a flashing Halloween necklace
- Add pumpkin picks between the ribbons
- Add a plaque with a Halloween saying



12. Clip the numbered treats throughout the wreath.

Open and enjoy your treats, one per day starting from October 19th. The 13th and last treat will be on October 31st Halloween.
